One Year of Waikīkī Safe & Sound!

Approaching the first year anniversary of Waikīkī Safe & Sound much has been accomplished.



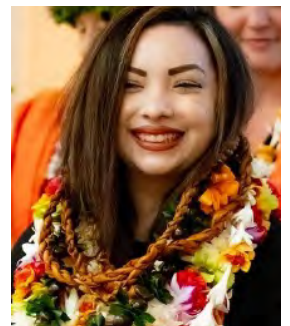
Overall crime stats have shown a marked improvement from the first half of 2022, before Waikīkī Safe and Sound, versus the first half of 2023:

- Drugs & Alcohol related crimes down 56%
- Robberies down 52%
- Criminal Property Damage, down 27%
- Car Break ins down 23%
- Theft down 13%
- Assaults down 13%
- Burglaries down 12%.

Over 100 chronic offenders have had geographic restrictions imposed keeping them out of Waikīkī. Kuhio Beach Park improvements have cleaned up major trouble spots and eye sores, including a major restroom renovation. Surveillance cameras have been brought back online. Beach closures have move up to midnight from 2:00 AM. Private security, hired by the City, has augmented after closing hour enforcement. The total number of homeless is down 43% to 143 individuals in May 2023 from 251 in September 2022.

The Waikīkī Business Improvement District Association has allocated funds to partner with the Institute of Human Services (IHS) in homeless outreach and mental health services. IHS will provide a full time Waikīkī Senior Case Manager.

The Waikīkī Business Improvement District has hired Katie Kaahanui as the Waikīkī Safe and Sound Coordinator. Her duties will include coordinating with all stakeholders on research identifying obstacles, working with social service organizations on finding solutions for people in need, maintaining a list of repeat offenders, working with HPD and Proscuters to keep them off the street, and exploring other funding sources for future efforts.

2023 Duke Kahanamoku Ocean Festival



The Duke Kahanamoku Ocean Festival returned to Waikiki for its 21st year running for 10 days around Duke's 133rd birthday on August 24th. The festival traditionally raises funds for the programs of the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation which carries the mission of financially supporting individuals and organizations that perpetuate the legacy of Duke Kahanamoku. Since 1986 the foundation has funded college scholarships for local watersports and volleyball athletes, and grants for local teams and events that perpetuate water sports, volleyball, or water safety. This year, in light of the devastating fires on Maui, the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation elected instead to donate the event proceeds of Duke Kahanamoku Ocean Festival to benefit our Maui community's recovery.

The Duke Kahanamoku Ocean Festival, formerly Duke's Oceanfest, started in 2002 as a one-day celebration of the release of the Duke Kahanamoku U.S. Postal Service stamp. Co-founders Jim Fulton and Chris Colgate recognized strong support from the community and decided to run a ho'olaule'a in Duke's honor the following year. From then on, the festival picked up momentum, adding many new events over the years and attracting participants and Duke Kahanamoku fans to Waikiki from all over the world. Now the festival features more than 20 ocean and beach competitions and events held over 10 days, mostly taking place at Queens on Waikiki Beach, a beloved place of Duke Kahanamoku, and centered around the giant statue commemorating his life and legacy.



Pamai Tenn, the Foundation's Liaison from the Estate of Nadine Kahanamoku, organizes the reverent sunrise birthday lei draping every August 24 at the statue. At this year's ceremony, the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) announced that Duke Kahanamoku is the recipient of the 6th Annual AAU Gussie Crawford Lifetime Achievement Award. The award is intended to recognize athletes whose efforts have paved the way for great change in amateur sports both on and off their playing surface and on the national or international stage. It was also created to recognize those athletes who did not necessarily receive the recognition they deserved during the time they competed.



Other returning events to the festival included the Hawaiian Airlines Opening Ceremony, the Wounded Warrior Canoe Regatta, the Outrigger Resorts & Hotels Beach Volleyball and Jrs. Challenges, the Aloha Collection Tandem Surfing Challenge, the Pacifico Longboard Classic, the Raising Cane's Going to the Dogs SurFur Competition, the Outrigger Resorts and Hotels Surfing Invitational, the Head High World of Foil Team Challenge, the Waikiki Nights Movie on the beach, the Top Am Junior Invitational, the Waiakea Water Menehune Surf Contest, the HTA Kokua Surf Jam, the Duke's Waikiki Ocean Mile Swim, and Surfboard Water Polo. New events this year were the OluKai Junior Lifeguard Leadership Challenge, a Henry Kapon concert at the Shell, Duke's Waikiki Waterman Challenge, and a Hawaii Water Safety Leadership Conference. Perhaps most unique to this year, the festival partnered with Nā Kama Kai to hold a paddle out to Queens in poignant tribute to victim and survivors of the Lahaina fires.

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Hawai'i Convention Center Assists Maui Wildfire Evacuees

The Hawai'i Convention Center served as a temporary American Red Cross Assistance Center in partnership with the Hawai'i Tourism Authority in August for evacuees from the heartbreaking and devastating wildfires on Maui.

Center staff worked with Red Cross volunteers to set up safe places for residents and visitors to sleep in its fourth-floor Ballroom, as well as shower and receive essentials such as food, water, and clothing. The Center also opened its Business Center so evacuees could use computers and print documents, and volunteers were on hand to assist with emotional support and coordinate lodging and travel.

Due to reduced demand, the Red Cross relocated the Oahu Assistance Center to the Ke'ehe Lagoon Memorial Hall, which remained open through August 16. The Assistance Center served nearly 300 visitors and residents since opening at the Center on August 9.
